GENERAL GUIDELINES

I. CASVA PREDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS

Applications are due November 15

One candidate for each category of fellowship; an individual may be nominated for no more than one fellowship.

*Renominations will be accepted on the basis of new application materials. Interested students should consult with the dissertation advisor and departmental chair to obtain nomination forms. After the application deadline, any inquiries should be directed to the Center by the chair of the department and not by the candidate.*

II. CASVA PREDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS FOR HISTORIANS OF AMERICAN ART TO TRAVEL ABROAD

Applications due February 15, 2009 for the period June 2009 through May 2010

2 nominations per department (for a total of six fellowships per year)

The Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts offers up to six fellowships to doctoral students in art history who are studying aspects of art and architecture of the United States, including native and pre-Revolutionary America. This fellowship is for a period of six to eight weeks of continuous travel abroad in areas such as Africa, Asia, or South America, as well as Europe, to sites of historical and cultural interest, including museums, exhibitions, collections, and monuments. The travel fellowship is intended to encourage a breadth of art-historical experience beyond the candidate's major field, not for the advancement of a dissertation. Preference will be accorded to those who have had little opportunity for

professional travel abroad. The amount of the award is dependent on the travel plan, with a maximum of \$4,500. A narrative report at the conclusion of the travel period is required. Individuals currently affiliated with the National Gallery of Art are not eligible for this fellowship.

### IV. DEDALUS FOUNDATION DISSERTATION FELLOWSHIP

Application deadline December 3, 2008

The Dedalus Foundation Dissertation Fellowship is awarded annually to a Ph.D. Candidate at an American university who is working on a dissertation related to modern art and modernism. Applications are solicited annually from doctoral art history programs throughout the country, with each program nominating one candidate. The fellowship award of \$20,000 is made from among these nominees by a committee of distinguished scholars.

Applications online; chair receives a letter from the Foundation each year in October

### VI. KRESS FOUNDATION PREDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS IN ART HISTORY AT FOREIGN INSTITUTIONS

Application deadline November 30, 2008

Four \$22,500-per-year Kress Institutional Fellowships in the History of European Art for a two-year research appointment in association with one of the following foreign institutes:

*Restrictions:* Restricted to pre-doctoral candidates in the history of art. Nominees must be U.S. citizens or individuals matriculated at an American university. Dissertation research must focus on European art before 1900.

#### VII: SAMUEL H. KRESS TRAVEL FELLOWSHIPS

Fifteen to twenty Kress Travel Fellowships in the History of Art for travel required for the completion of dissertation research on European art. Stipends generally range from \$3500 to \$10,000. Dissertation research must focus on European art before 1900.

*Restrictions:* Restricted to pre-doctoral candidates in the history of art. Nominees must be U.S. citizens or individuals matriculated at an American university.

*Application procedures:* Candidates must be nominated by their art history department.

*Deadline:* November 30.

## VIII. SAMUEL H. KRESS FOUNDATION DISSERTATION FELLOWSHIP OF THE SOCIETY OF ARCHITECTURAL HISTORIANS

The 2009 Award--\$15,000

In a joint program with the Samuel H. Kress Foundation, the Society of Architectural Historians is pleased to present, for the first time in the history of the Society, the creation of a new dissertation fellowship. The fellowship will support preparation of a dissertation focusing on the history of architecture and the built environment in Europe from ancient times through 1800. The subject area can include architectural, interior and landscape design, preservation and urban planning in Europe. The Samuel H. Kress Foundation Dissertation Fellowship of the Society of Architectural Historians is designed to assist during a critical time in the career development of graduate students in architectural history. The fellowship will support travel and research and will recognize important contributions to knowledge both in uncovering new sources and/or in proffering innovative research and framing of issues.

### PRESIDENTIAL FELLOWSHIP

24-month award; Art History may nominate one candidate

The Presidential Fellowship is funded by the President of the University and awarded by The Graduate School. This highly competitive award is the most prestigious fellowship awarded by Northwestern. The fellowship will be awarded to candidates who combine outstanding intellectual or creative ability with the capacity to play an active part in the life of the Society of Fellows. Recipients of the Presidential Fellowship become part of Northwestern University's Society of Fellows. The Society of Fellows meets twice per quarter and enables stellar students from across the university to have interdisciplinary interactions with their peers in other fields. The goal is to create future leaders who are enthusiastic and literate about the broad scholarship of the university. All Presidential Fellows must participate in the Society of Fellows functions; an exception is made for students not in residence at the time of Society meetings. Applications are by nomination only.

Deadline: Friday October 24, 2008

\* GRADUATE RESEARCH GRANTS do not require departmental nomination (The Graduate Research Grant (GRG) is intended to help PhD and MFA students in historically underfunded disciplines meet expenses related to scholarly research and creative endeavors. The maximum award amount is \$3,000. Awards are for a twelve-month period.

At the time of application for a Graduate Research Grant, the student must have completed 3 quarters of full-time full tuition registration toward the PhD or MFA degree in The

Graduate School. Students who are on an extension of the deadline for the completion of all PhD or MFA requirements are not eligible for a Graduate Research Grant. A student may receive only one grant under this program during his or her graduate career at Northwestern. Awards will not be granted for retroactive payments. Applicants who have applied before and have not received an award may apply again.

Department approval: Electronic submission of an application by the designated department or program person (see below) constitutes confirmation that the application has been vetted and endorsed by the department or program.

Deadline and Notification dates: Grants are awarded three times during the academic year. Deadlines for receipt of proposals are noon on October 5, January 4, and April 4. Awards will be announced within 2 months of each deadline.
